Book Reviews

The Peculiar Case of the Electric Constable. London, Oneworld Publications, 2013. (Carol Baxter)

This book proved a fascinating read. When Carol Baxter was writing a history of her first fleet ancestors, the name of John Tawell cropped up. When researching this person she learned that John was a Quaker who was convicted of forgery, transported to Sydney, and where he opened Australia's first pharmacy and made a fortune . When he returned to England after 15 years he joined his wife and family. However, the story becomes even more bizarre when John in 1845, is convicted of poisoning his mistress and after a trial, was hanged. This is truly "a delicious true tale of murder and scientific revolution in Victorian England". Available at Camden Library at 364.152/BAX

Across Great Divides. Glenbrook, NSW, Birrong Books, 2013 (Susan E. Boyer).

True stories of life at Sydney Cove during early settlement. When I am researching my family history, I have come across some family that were part of the first settlement in Sydney Harbour. What was life like in the early settlement? This book addresses the social issues of this convict and military settlement, but



also looks at the interaction with the aborigines. The stories are true and vividly capture the struggle of the early years. Recommended reading to people who want to know more about the fascinating and remarkable of the human experience on the Australian continent. The Spirits of Gallipoli: A Centenary of Anzacs. North Ryde, Rawson Graphics, 2015 (Kim Phillips).

This book tells the story of 100 brave Australian soldiers who lost their lives in the Gallipoli campaign. Chapter One covers the landing and the battle, followed by the lives of 9 soldiers (with pictures and family details), who died on 25 April, 100 years ago. Further chapters cover the months of 1915 from May to December 2015, when 3 soldiers die in December 1915. The book is well illustrated with photos of soldiers, places, gravestones, memorials and maps. The back cover holds a CD which lists and honours the 7,249 Australian soldiers commemorated at Gallipoli. The forward of the book states “ Kim Phillips’ devoted work in collecting all the valuable information of these great hearted men has been itself truly heroic, and *The Spirits of Gallipoli: A Centenary of Anzacs* will prove an invaluable tool for present and future researchers.” I bought my copy, hot off the press at the Penrith Library Conference on 14 March 2015. A bargain at \$50, especially when you consider all the work that has gone into its production.

All the Way To the USA: Australian WW11 War Brides. by Robyn Arrowsmith. 2013.

This book was shown to me by Del Clinton at the last Family History meeting. The book told a wonderful heart-warming story about the many (15,000) women who married American servicemen. As Bob Bach commented in the Newsletter of the US 41st Infantry Division (Feb 2014)”Robyn Arrowsmith turned a doctorate thesis into a fascinating story of courageous women, who grabbed life by the seat of the pants and made a go of it . I must recommend this book to all who want to learn about love, hardship, bravery, strength and endurance. All came in a single beautiful package that was the Australian War Bride.”

Robyn’s own story is a fascinating one. A great read, Highly recommended.
