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## **The Hand Loom Weavers of Paisley, Scotland – Aileen Trinder**

Aileen Trinder from Pastkeys has sent details of a transcription article which may be of interest to members.

*Some years ago, at one of the Conferences down south, Ray Thorburn spoke about the Scottish clearances where a group of these hand-loom weavers from Paisley Scotland were sent to Tasmania. The Beejapore arrived in Sydney on 7<sup>th</sup> January 1853 from Liverpool after a voyage of 85 days – the shortest on record. She brought 911 emigrants and news to the 12<sup>th</sup> October. Of the adult emigrants one half were from the Isle of Skye and about 200 were Paisley weavers; 56 children died on the passage principally from scarlet fever and measles, and the vessel was placed in quarantine. The ones who arrived at Sydney were the first group & were selected by the Emigration Commissioners in London at the request of some Colonists who were over there at the time.. The Colonists said that, if the men who came out had their families with them, they would be less likely to desert their employers to take off to the goldfields & also that the weavers would have been used to being shepherds at different periods so wouldn't find that work monotonous.. Unfortunately, measles spread throughout the ship and the mortality amongst the very young children and babies was extremely high, both before and after arrival when the ship was placed in quarantine.*

## **1939 British Register – now available on Find My past For Free**

In December 1938 it was announced in the House of Commons that in the event of war, a National Register would be taken that listed the personal details of every civilian in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. This Register was to be a critical tool in coordinating the war effort at home. It would be used to issue identity cards, organise rationing and more. On September 1st, 1939 Germany invaded Poland, putting the wheels in motion for Britain to declare war on the 3rd. On September 5th, the National Registration Act received royal assent and Registrar General Sir Sylvanus Vivian announced that National Registration Day would be September 29th.

Having issued forms to more than 41 million people, the enumerators were charged with the task of visiting every household in Great Britain and Northern Ireland to collect the name, address, marital status and other key details of every civilian in the country, issuing identity cards on the spot. The identity cards issued were essential items from the point the Register was taken right up until 1952, when the legal requirement to carry them ceased. Until that point, every member of the civilian population had to be able to present their card upon request by an official (children's cards were looked after by parents), or bring them to a police station within 48 hours. The reasons were numerous – it was essential to know who everyone was, of course, and to track their movements as they moved house, as well as to keep track of the population as babies were born and people passed away. The 1939 Register, then, represents one of the most important documents in 20th century Britain. The information it contains not only helped toward the war effort, it was also used in the founding of the National Health System NHS.

This Register is now available free on Find My Past if you have a subscription, CAFHS has such a subscription so as a member you can use this register to trace family members who may have been living in England at that time
